My Dear Parishioners,

Since arriving in the Parish in November 2017, I have been overjoyed by the welcome and support that parishioners have extended to me. Serving at Saint Michael's Parish Meadowbank has been a true blessing. Finance at St Michael's Meadowbank

with Stephen Topple and the Parish Finance Committee

Like you and me, the Parish at St Michael's must pay its way and parish resources must be managed. The Parish Priest, or in our case the Administrator, has the responsibility to do this. He is assisted by the Parish Finance Committee. Myself and a handful of other parishioners make up this committee.



Look around the parish. The church, the Bush Hall and most of the school and car park have been built by the parish community with monies raised from parishioners or by loans repaid with parishioner donations. The last loan by the parish was for the Bush Hall. The Finance Committee considers the resources available to manage the parish. This includes monitoring the collections to see if they cover the parish commitments such as the priests' stipend, electricity and insurance, telephone, altar bread, candles and repairs and maintenance. The Committee also oversees developments such as the financing and construction of the Bush Hall and the remediation of our parish block of land to resume its use as a car park.

I have been in the parish for close to forty years and my children went to school at St Michael's. My wife Jennifer played the organ at the Sunday Mass for some years. You may see me mostly at the 8am Mass where I am rostered as an Acolyte.

It is necessary and important to be involved in one's parish. Our faith calls for more than Mass on Sunday. The parish, my parish, as our Christian community, requires an ongoing commitment. I see it as part of my faith to use my talents to contribute to the life of the parish. Therefore, over the years I have tried to contribute where my skills permit.

What is a Parish Finance Committee?

The Parish Finance Committee, a committee required by Church law, is a consultative body of the Parish, presided over by the Parish Priest and consists of diverse members of the Parish community, who share and offer advice and consultation to the Parish Priest. The Finance Committee seeks to lessen the burden of the Parish Priest in his role of administering parish finances, in maintaining parish properties, in planning for future capital works, in raising necessary finances and in establishing a framework for greater shared responsibility within parish life.

My involvement with the Finance Committee commenced when Fr John Alt was Parish Priest. I commenced chairing the Finance Committee when Father Peni was appointed. For many years I was the parish representative on the St Michael's Primary School Finance Committee. I have also been an acolyte for more than 25 years.

Regular Weekly Giving

The chart below may assist you, along with your prayerful consideration, as to the amount of your weekly Sunday offering:

INCOME VS PROPORTIONAL GIVING

A Suggested Total Weekly Gift to the Church should take into account the 1st, 2nd and special collections that occur throughout the year.

In Catholic Parishes, we have 3 main areas of regular giving.

1. First Collection at Mass - Assists with the stipend of the priest (\$18,500 p.a.) and food expenses for the priest. Also assists with the expenses of the Archbishop and priest expenses at other parishes and chaplaincies that are unable to raise sufficient funds to assist with the expenses of a priest.

The Parish has a break-even budget to raise \$1350 per week in 2018 for the first collection.

2. Second Collection at Mass and Parish Planned Giving (Envelopes/Direct Debit/Credit Card giving) - Assists in the Expenses of the Parish: staff, utilities, church and altar, repairs and maintenance of church, presbytery and site, insurance, pastoral and sacramental programs. Contributions receive a 25% Tax deduction.

The Parish has a break-even budget to raise \$1900 per week in 2018 on the second collection.

3. Occasional Special Collections - for the Archdiocesan Charitable Works Fund Appeal and other Catholic charitable activities. Contributions receive a 100% tax deduction.

Please note: Although St Michael's Meadowbank Primary School is connected to the St Michael's Meadowbank Parish, there is no income or reimbursement that the Parish receives from the School to assist in providing the liturgical, pastoral and facility support that the Parish provides to the School and the families who attend the School. Futhermore, the Parish lay and priestly staff are funded entirely from parishioner contributions at Sunday Mass and not from School Fees or any levy charged by the School.

Direct Transfer Giving

Please consider using a direct recurring automatic transfer for regular Sunday offerings. It is a safe, secure process that each person can easily setup via their own online banking to give to the parish on a weekly, fortnightly or monthly basis.

Those who use Direct Transfer or Credit Card can still choose to receive parish envelopes. Please let the parish office know that you intend to use credit card or transfer giving so that you can be given a giver number and your giving can be linked to your name for tax deduction purposes.

Please note: The Parish does not strongly encourage large credit card giving, although the parish has a facility to help process donations in some situations. Credit card debt can be a terrible burden on a family and the parish would prefer that parishioners give from their savings and not give while adding to their debt. Please also be mindful that the bank charges the Parish a 7% credit card transaction fee per donation.

The Fruit of our Giving — Liturgical Ministry

A Journey of Parish Faith and Service with Sue Metzmacher (Chairperson of the Parish Liturgy Committee)

Helmut and I moved to Melrose Park and became parishioners of St Michael's Meadowbank in July 1969 – our first child was born one month later. At first I felt quite isolated as we had no close family living in Australia but I soon realised we were part of a wonderful, caring parish community.

After our third child was born in 1974 and with our first son starting school at St Michael's Primary, I began to take a more active role in the parish, joining the school's Ladies Auxiliary and becoming a catechist. By 1976 I was also an active member of The Walkabout Group – we used the Department of Health mini-buses to pick-up local nursing home



residents and take them out for the day, monthly on Sundays, providing afternoon tea wherever we happened to be. I'm sure I was prompted to do this because my mother was, at that time, hospitalised and in a coma for some time in my home town of London. I couldn't do anything practical to help her so channelled my energy and emotions into doing the kind of things she did throughout her life. At this time, I was invited to assist at certain Masses with distribution of Communion, which truly was a privilege.

Around this time, three or four of us school mums started the Children's Liturgy at 10am Sunday Masses – this was on a monthly basis. Soon after, when my son was in Year 6, I investigated forming a youth group in the parish. I visited a couple of parishes and used the model from Wyoming in the Gosford area where our family were often visitors at the church. SMYG's operated successfully for a number of years – I have to admit it had more of a social rather than spiritual nature. During this time, I was fostering (part time) 6yr old twins from a neighbouring Catholic mother who had mental health problems.

By 1981 my three children were attending different schools and I was involved at these in a variety of ways. For the next ten years I was not so involved in parish then Fr Langtry invited me to join the parish liturgy group and that has remained my primary focus up to the present time.

If I ask myself why I took on these "tasks" I can only believe it was my mother's influence on my life together with other role models in the parish and with the encouragement of Sr Margaret our Pastoral Care person at the time.

St Michael's became my adopted family and I wanted to give back some of the kindnesses and generosity shown to me and my family here. Also, my mother was very active in our local and parish community by the time we were teenagers, helping many people in different ways. She wouldn't say "No" to anyone unless it was almost impossible for her to assist. She was and is a role model for me even though she died many years ago. My family had a fairly hard life during and after World War II but received assistance from a number of people and we knew, without being told, that you don't take without giving back when and where you can.

Whilst my husband, Helmut, doesn't get overly involved in similar activities, he has always been very supportive in many ways.

The total receipts are matched for funding on the various religious, liturgical and pastorals ministries after allocating required funds for parish administration and maintenance of the parish building and grounds as well as presbytery & living expenses and provision for the payment of interest and the amount to be paid with respect to the Charitable Works Fund assessment shortfall.

- *4 Office supplies, printing and stationary, photocopy costs, bulletin costs, maintenance of office equipment, postage, costs of communications via telephone, internet and banking charges.

Budget Surplus over the next 5 Years

If the financial situation at the end of the 2017 financial year and at the end of December 2017 continued for the next 5 years and there were no adjustments, then the parish would be in significant financial difficulty, with expected deficits between \$10,000-\$30,000p.a for the Parish, and deficits of \$15,000 to \$20,000 on the first collection.

The Parish Finance Committee is planning for improvements to the parish's financial viability over the next 12 months. The Finance Committee has already implemented measures to inform the parish of a weekly collections target via the Parish Bulletin, have renegotiated the Parish Hall usage for After-School-Care and have implemented stronger oversight of expenditure. Assuming that these three measures are successful, then the parish should generate a surplus of \$15,000 p.a. over the next 5 years. It is anticipated that once a surplus is generated, then additional pastoral programs and initiatives could be considered.

Parish Giving stays with the Parish

In recent months, the Catholic Church in Australia has attracted considerable media attention in relation to the finances of the Catholic Church. The Church is committed to the National Redress Scheme for Survivors of Sexual Abuse and the Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney has already earmarked income from certain investments for this purpose.

However, it is very important for parishioners to know that donations given for parish purposes will be used for parish purposes.

Various figures have been suggested in the media regarding the supposed assets of the Catholic Church in Sydney and beyond. Some of these figures are inflated and deceiving. For instance, if St Mary's Cathedral is valued as a potential site for a Westfield or a high rise apartment development, it may appear to be of enormous value; however, its value is as a spiritual and artistic patrimony of the Church and our nation. Rather than being an income earning 'asset,' the Cathedral and most historic churches cost a great deal to maintain.

The Catholic Church is much more than our buildings – we are principally our people and the works of the Church. The Catholic Church is the nation's largest non-government provider of pastoral care, primary and secondary schooling, tertiary education, healthcare, marriage preparation and counselling, social welfare services especially to the poor, aged care and palliative care. In some of these areas, the Catholic Church makes an even bigger contribution than any government in Australia. If the Church wasn't doing our mission, who would?

Some examples of the vital works of the Catholic Church are:

- The Catholic Church is the largest non-government provider of health care services in Australia, including aged and community services.
- St Vincent's Health Australia, for example, is the nation's largest not-for-profit Catholic health and aged care provider. It is a clinical, research and education leader working in private hospitals, public hospitals and aged care services for all people.
- The Catholic Church provides social and welfare services to more than a million Australians a year including more than 500 programs in the areas of disability, children and youth services, counselling, employment, parental assistance, refugees and assistance to the homeless.
- In education the current recurrent savings to NSW and Commonwealth Governments of not having to educate Catholic Systemic school students in state schools exceeds \$483 million per annum.
- The Catholic Church has also built much of our country's social infrastructure in these and other areas. It continues to build and sustain local communities of faith and service, and to support families and individuals where there is often little other support. It cares for the most disadvantaged and is a voice for the voiceless. It provides most of these things for our whole society, Catholics and non-Catholics alike.

But the Church can only do these good things for our community because generation after generation of Catholics have built up the infrastructure of churches, schools, convents, Vinnies centres and the rest that people call 'Church assets'. Many 'Church assets' are in fact held on trust for specific purposes nominated by the government or benefactors who provided them (e.g. school grants, money earmarked for charitable works). Others are held to back employee entitlements, debts etc. Others again (like our cathedral) are artistic patrimony of the Church, city and nation. In all these cases the Church is not free to just dispose of the assets as it pleases and it is misleading to lump all these things together as "the wealth of the Church".

Legacy and Bequest Giving

What we do with the gifts we have been given expresses what we believe. A legacy or a bequest is a gift left for the benefit of future generations. As good stewards, a Legacy program ensures that future needs of our Church and ministries are met. Our Christian faith, even in death, calls us to witness the new life that God gives in Christ through his death and resurrection.

A gift to the Parish Legacy Program may take many forms such as:

- Lump sum bequests or percentage of your estate as stated in your Will
- Beneficiary of Life Insurance, Superannuation or Tax Free Savings Account
- Gifts of cash or publicly traded shares during your lifetime
- Bequest of a specific asset such as real estate, jewellery or shares in your will.

Gifts may be made by individuals, families, organizations and/or corporations. These gifts may be directed to the general revenues of the Parish or to any specific ministry within the Parish such as:

- Debt reduction Youth and Education Music Liturgy
- Adult Faith Formation Evangelization Outreach

By making a bequest to the Church, you can also elect to contribute to a specific important work of the Church, for example the Charitable Works Fund, The Priests Retirement Foundation, The Clerical Medical Fund of the Archdiocese of Sydney or the Clergy Remuneration System of the Archdiocese of Sydney.

For your final wishes to be honoured, you must have a valid Will. For this reason, it is very important that you arrange to have a valid Will drawn up by a solicitor. To learn more or discuss your Legacy Giving please contact the parish office.

Cardinal Gilroy Society

The Cardinal Gilroy Society has been established to honour the generosity of those individuals who have pledged a bequest to any of the good works of the Sydney Archdiocese. The Society is a way that we can thank you now for your foresight and very special contribution. Cardinal George Pell is the patron of the Society.

The Society is named after Cardinal Norman Gilroy, Archbishop of Sydney from 1940 to 1971. Cardinal Gilroy made a significant contribution to Australian society and to the Catholic community. He was a veteran of Gallipoli, was ordained a priest in Rome, became the first Australian-born Cardinal and the first Cardinal since the reformation to receive a knighthood. In 1970 he was named Australian of the Year.

Mortgage and Debt Reduction

The current balance of our parish debt is \$0. Due to the incredible generosity of many generations of parishioners, the Parish is currently not in any debt. However the Parish has very little savings, and the income generated from these savings currently means the Parish would find it difficult to undertake any new developments. New pastoral initiatives or developments will require additional funding and may also involve future loans for the parish.

In the early days of the Parish and until very recently (January 2017) the Parish has been responsible for a variety of loans, including loans for the building of the Church, the Bush Parish Hall, the building of the parish carpark, for the building and refurbishment of St Michael's Meadowbank Primary School and so on. From 1 January 2017, the loan balance of \$177,441 still owing for the Bush Parish Hall was transferred to St Michael's Primary School as part of a restructure of the Parish Building Levies and the Parish School Building Funds.

Workplace Giving and Donation Matching

More and more Australian companies are undertaking employee matched giving programs. In fact close to 70% of companies in Australia now support their employees fundraising efforts and/or workplace giving by matching the contribution.

What is workplace giving?

Workplace Giving is a joint relationship between employers, employees and registered charities. Individuals contribute a small portion of their pre-tax salary to a charity that offers a tax deduction. The individual will then receive the tax benefit straight away rather than waiting until the end of the financial year to submit a tax return. For example, if you donate \$20, it will only cost you \$12.60 (if you are on a high income) but the charity will receive the full \$20. In most cases, employers will also match staff donations dollar for dollar, so the value of your donation will double to \$40 direct to the charity of your choice.

If you don't know if your employer will match your donations, then ask your Human Resources Department if your company has a matched giving program. If you work for a medium or large-sized company, then more than likely they will match your donations to charities, to special collections and to the Parish.

25% of regular Parish donations are eligible for tax deductions and 100% of Charitable Works Fund donations receive tax deductions. You and your employer could consider supporting the Charitable Works Fund or the Parish through matched giving.

CHARITABLE WORKS FUND

Archdiocesan Charitable Works Fund Appeal

Every year the Archdiocese of Sydney assesses parishes and determines an annual quote that each parish needs to raise for the Charitable Works Fund. One of the most moving experiences for me at St Michael's was World Youth Day in 2008. St Michael's was rich in warm hospitality towards the people who came who were from all walks of life. I remember as clear as day a young man, a priest, getting off the bus and asking me to take him to the Pope as he NEEDED to speak with him. "Sure", I said, "but we need a helicopter!" He was so open and willing to do this because he heard so much about Father Bush and wanted to pay him the respect that he deserved. This humble act from one priest to another made such a profound impact on me and brought tears to my eyes at the time and remembering it still does.

Yes, all the priests I have had the privilege of knowing have all been wonderful – Father Phan, Father Kene and now Father James. To me Father James is the most exciting priest I have met. He is warm and very caring. He is dedicated, determined, creative,

kind and full of the Holy Spirit. He is a great guide and he has truly moved me beyond words. I am so grateful to him for showering our community with all of his gifts.

Knowing Jesus gives me great joy. I have grown to love Him more and more each day. He brings sunshine to my life and when David wrote the Psalm "The Lord is my Shepherd there is nothing I shall want", I understand what he means as life has its ups and downs and whether I am sitting at the well with Jesus, or at the foot of the Cross, my words are "into your hands I commend my spirit". - Our parish electricity and utilities bill in October 2017 was \$2,100.
- We have over **130 volunteers** serving in ministry.
- Over **130** tax receipts were issued for 2017 donations.
- 107 guests attended the Parish Volunteers Thank You Luncheon in December 2017.
- 146 families were involved in the Parish Sacramental Programs in 2017 and 160 children made First Reconciliation, First Communion or Confirmation in 2017.
- 330 children with 75% of these being Catholics attended St Michael's Meadowbank Primary School in 2017.
- Our current Catechists have a combined 117 years of service.
- 240 children received weekly classes in Catholic Scripture at the 3 Public Schools in the Parish (Meadowbank Public, West Ryde Public, Ermington Public).
- It costs approx. \$700/year to supply donation envelopes to parishioners.
- In a typical month we use approximately **3,500 hosts** at a cost of \$150 each month.
- During a typical month, **22 sick and homebound parishioners** are visited and brought Holy Communion on a weekly basis.
